15	some witnesses today; am I correct?
16	MR. RABAGO: There may be one witness, Your
17	Honor, depending on what we hear at the beginning of the
18	proceeding.

20	witnesses that would prefer well, that would object to a

MR. RABAGO: Well first, Your Honor, we are prepared to go forward either on the evidence and affidavit as well as the -- also the affidavit supporting the complaint, so that's a verified complaint, and I would be calling my client here today. I have witnesses -- i mean exhibits that have been marked and a courtesy copy for the Court.

However, it was in yesterday I think, or 11 today before in the Daily Star, it was published with an 12 interview of the president of the Defendant that she was 13 going to comply and register. So I addressed and asked 14 Counsel before court started this morning if -- if that 15 was in fact the case because it will determine how much 16 time we may need to spend on this and whether or not we 17 need to call my client. 18

He indicated that, that they were not going to be doing that, but I wanted to make sure, now that we're in open court and on the record, that I would ask the Court and let you know, counsel know that question so that we can have that on the record.

24 MR. BARBOUR: Your Honor, if I may clarify 25 something. I believe the question was asked whether we

filed anything, and to that question, I answered, no, 1 because we have not filed anything with this Court. I did not see --3

THE COURT: You mean with the Corporation 4 Commission? 5

2

MR. BARBOUR: No, with the Court, I 6 understood the question to be asking whether we filed 7 anything with the Court. So, of course, I said; no. 8 I am not aware that anything has been filed 9 with the Corporation Commission yet, but it may have; it 10 may be it may be processing now as -- I couldn't tell you. 11 So, is it fair for us to assume THE COURT: 12 then that there's been no filing with the Corporation 13 Commission and we show proceed based on that assumption. 14 MR. BARBOUR: I think we can proceed on that 15 16 assumption; yes. THE COURT: Mr. Rabago, how do you want to 17 go forward? 18 MR. RABAGO: I'm happy to put my client on 19 the stand and take some evidence. I do believe that the 20 affidavit is sufficient and the exhibits which are true 21 22 and accurate copies of what has been presented with the complaint are sufficient. But I'm happy to present my 23 client and maybe present a number of questions without 24 having to go into necessarily everything, but certainly to 25

1 the material allegations.

THE COURT: Mr. Barbour, what is your 2 preference? The affidavit is an attachment to at least 3 part of the court pleadings, what do you think we should 4 do this morning? 5 MR. BARBOUR: I would like to hear the 6 witness speak. 7 THE COURT: You would like to have the 8 witness called? 9 MR. BARBOUR: Well, I mean if Mr. Rabago, if 10 11 he's giving us an alternative between going with the 12 affidavit and calling some witness, I prefer that we call 13 his witness. THE COURT: I'm going to defer to you on 14 15 that, because I know this is an important matter to your client, so I think it's appropriate to have some testimony 16 and some cross-examination, parties wish to do that, so 17 are you calling Barbara Tellman? 18 MR. RABAGO: I would, Your Honor. And I also 19 wanted to inquire of the Court if the Court wanted a few 20 opening remarks before we begin testimony or afterwards. 21 THE COURT: I prefer to have it in closing. 22 Is there any objection to that? 23 MR. BARBOUR: No. Your Honor. 24 25 MR. RABAGO: Okay, thank you.

Your Honor. And also, to clarify, about 1 whether or not they were filing, I actually asked two 2 questions because we received the --3 THE COURT: It doesn't matter to me now. At 4 this point I've been told, and there's no misunderstanding 5 on my part, that it's unknown whether there have been 6 Corporation Commission filings in Arizona --7 MR. RABAGO: Correct. 8 THE COURT: -- and there have been no 9 filings with the Superior Court on behalf the Defendant, 10 so that's crystal clear to me. 11 Any question that you have about that? 12 13 MR. RABAGO: No, Your Honor. The only thing I wanted to clarify to the Court I asked two questions of 14 them; one was about the filing with the court, apparently, 15 one was made one was about the ACC filing --16 THE COURT: That doesn't matter to me, I 17 mean oftentimes there are misunderstandings --18 MR. RABAGO: Sure. 19 THE COURT: -- there may have been one here, 20 I'm not concerned about that. 21 MR. RABAGO: Very good. Thank you, Your 22 Honor. 23 THE COURT: Ms. Tellman, will you come 24 forward and the Clerk of the Court will swear you in. 25

1 (Whereupon Ms. Tellman was sworn.) 2 3 THE COURT: Ms. Tellman, please walk up to 4 the witness chair, watch your step, take a seat. I'm 5 going to give you -- I'm going ask you a couple questions 6 and I'm going to ask you to speak loudly and clearly for 7 me. 8 First of all, tell us your full name and 9 spell it for us. 10 THE WITNESS: Barbara, B-A-R-B-A-R-A; Jane, 11 J-A-N-E; Tellman, T-E-L-L-M-A-N. 12 13 THE COURT: Thank you. The lawyers are going to ask you some questions. Go ahead, Counsel. 14 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. If the 15 Court pleases, may I approach the and bench give a 16 courtesy copy of the exhibits? 17 THE COURT: Sure. 18 MR. RABAGO: If you would like. 19 Tell me what it is. THE COURT: 20 MR. RABAGO: It's just a whole set of 21 exhibits, I don't know if we'll use all of them just for 22 the Court to have it on the bench. I already submitted a 2.3 copy to the clerk. 24 THE COURT: I will go ahead and take those. 25

I won't -- I won't consider them until there is 1 appropriate foundation --2 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. 3 THE COURT: -- and they are admitted. 4 MR. RABAGO: Absolutely. 5 THE COURT: I appreciate I've been given a 6 courtesy copy of exhibits. 7 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. I also 8 have given a copy --9 THE COURT: A through -- well, I guess it's 10 not A through -- it's A, B --11 MR. RABAGO: A, B, C, F. 12 THE COURT: F, G, D, I, J, K, L, and M. All 13 right. Thank you, Counsel. 14 MR. RABAGO: Very good, Your Honor. 15 16 BARBARA JANE TELLMAN, 17 having been duly sworn, was examined and testified as 18 follows: 19 DIRECT EXAMINATION 20 21 BY MR. RABAGO: 2.2 Ms. Tellman, are you a citizen of the State of *O*. 23 Arizona? 24 A. Yes, I am. 25

1 *Q.* And are you registered to vote?

2 A. Yes, I am.

3 Q. Did you vote in the primary election this year?
4 A. Yes, I did.

5 *Q*. This is for the City of Tucson City Counsel 6 elections?

7 A. Right.

Q. And let me ask you, have you ever been a party in
9 an election-related cases before?

A. Yes. I was a party to a case in 1990, I believe and '91, somewhere around there relating to a referendum on a re-zoning where our right to be on the ballot was challenged and I was the party representing the right to be on the ballot and we -- we prevailed in all three levels.

16 *Q.* Okay; thank you. So do you consider yourself an 17 engaged and a patriotic citizen?

18 *A*. Yes.

Q. Let me ask you this, you filed this case, you're the Plaintiff, is that the reason why we're here because of your belief in the system?

A. Yes, and I've been been involved in election integrity issues for the last 12 years, extensively.

Q. Okay; thank you. And when you say, election integrity issues, can you just quickly elaborate, what 1 does that mean?

I have been an observer for the County and the 2 А. City elections, I've observed the tabulation and the 3 practice and the ballots for the past approximately 4 eight-year. I am a member of the Pima County Election 5 Integrity Commission, which oversees election integrity 6 for Pima County, and I am actually the vice chair of that 7 commission, but I'm not here representing that commission 8 in any way whatsoever. 9

I'm also one of the two citizens appointed by the Board of Supervisors to test the accuracy of the computers before and after each election.

Q. Thank you. Now, are you familiar with the name Foundation For Responsible Accountable Government, Inc.? *A.* Yes.

Q. Now, do you -- do you know whether or not that is a corporation that is organized and registered in the State of Arizona?

A. I could not find it as a corporation registered
in Arizona.

21 *Q.* What did you do to determine that?

A. I checked the Corporation -- Corporation

23 Commission website.

Q. And -- and you did not find a corporation by that name?

1 *A*. **No**.

Did you research this corporation's state of 2 *O*. organization elsewhere on the internet? 3 Yes, I managed to determine that it was А. 4 incorporated in Delaware. 5 How did you do that? 6 *O*. I went on the internet. 7 А. And what website did you go, where did you look О. 8 it up? 9 It the State of Delaware Secretary of State's 10 А. website. 11 Okay. Is the Secretary of State or Division of 0. 12 Corporation? 13 Division of Corporation, sorry; yeah. 14 A. And what did you learn there from looking at 15 О. that website? 16 I learned from there, and one other source, 17 А. Citizen Audit, that it is a corporation that is registered 18 as a trade organization. 19 Okay. 20 Q. MR. RABAGO: Your Honor, I'd like to present 21 the witness with a copy of Exhibit A, I don't know if the 22 Court wants me to use the actual marked exhibits? 23 THE COURT: It's better that you use the 24 official exhibits. 25

MR. RABAGO: Thank you. 1 THE COURT: Mr. Barbour, at any time you 2 want to review the exhibits --3 MR. BARBOUR: May I confer with Mr. Rabago? 4 MR. RABAGO: Correct, the exhibits I handed 5 defense counsel, except the clerk renumbered them instead 6 of A, they are numerical, A is one, Roman numeral. 7 MR. BARBOUR: Okay. 8 BY MR. RABAGO: 9 What I'll do, I'll hand you all the exhibits. 10 О. I'm going to ask you to look at Exhibit 1 --11 А. Okav. 12 13 Q. -- for the Plaintiff. THE COURT: Are you calling it one, sir? 14 MR. RABAGO: Yes, it's been marked by the 15 clerk as Exhibit Number 1. I apologize for not informing 16 the Court earlier. 17 BY MR. RABAGO: 18 Now, have you had a chance to look at that 19 *Q*. document? 20 Yes. А. 21 Now, is that a copy of a web page that you 22 О. observed that was then printed out and made into an 2.3 exhibit? 24 25 *A*. Yes; as far as I can tell, yes. PIMA COUNTY - SUPERIOR COURT

And is that the information that you refer to 1 О. about showing that this Defendant is, in fact, registered 2 out of state in the State of Delaware? 3 Yes. А. 4 Now, does the website you looked at, was it a an О. 5 official government website? 6 Yes. it was. 7 А. MR. BARBOUR: Objection, foundation. 8 THE COURT: I'll sustain that. Are you 9 moving to strike? 10 MR. BARBOUR: Yes, Your Honor. 11 THE COURT: Grant the motion to strike. 12 MR. RABAGO: Your Honor, I haven't asked to 13 admit it yet, so I'm not sure what is being stricken. 14 THE COURT: I moved to strike the last -- I 15 granted the motion to strike the last answer, you -- you 16 may ask the witness, to the best of her knowledge, this is 17 an an official government website, but you still haven't 18 clarified what government you're talking about. 19 MR. RABAGO: Absolutely. Thank you, Your 20 21 Honor. BY MR. RABAGO: 2.2 Ms. Tellman, to the best of your knowledge, based 23 *O*. on the research that you did in to this particular 24 corporation, was this an official government website? 25

And were there -- was it marked for which state? 2 *O*. The State of Delaware, Division of 3 A Corporations -- Department of State Division of 4 Corporations. 5 Now, you don't live in Delaware, right? 6 О. Okay. No. 7 А. Never been to Delaware? 8 О. No -- well, I have been there. 9 А. Now, let me -- so your testimony is that, based 10 О. on the research you've done and you looked exhaustively on 11 the internet, would that be fair to say? 12 13 А. Yeah, I tried. О. And you could only find one register corporation 14 with this exact name in the State of Delaware? 15 Correct. 16 А. That question wasn't very clear THE COURT: 17 You mean from all the searches you did, ma'am, 18 to me. that -- and I'm assuming you searched all 50 states? 19 THE WITNESS: No, I did not search all 50 20 21 states. THE COURT: How many did you search? 2.2 THE WITNESS: I was given an indication that 23 they were a corporation in Delaware so that's the state I 24 checked out. 25

THE COURT: So your last answer would have 1 been that -- the answer -- the last answer Mr. Rabago, was 2 for the state of Delaware, this was the only corporation 3 that had this name? 4 THE WINTESS: Right. 5 THE COURT: All right. Go ahead, sir. 6 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. 7 BY MR. RABAGO: 8 And when you were doing those searches, are you О. 9 familiar with doing internet research? 10 Yes, I'm very familiar with it. 11 A When you type in a name, such as Foundation for 12 О. Responsible Accountable Government, Inc., does it bring up 13 a number of different names that are the same or similar? 14 15 А. I found some similar names, not exact. Okay. So is it fair to say that when you did 16 О. your search, you know at the bottom of the web screen 17 there are a number of pages that will show up --18 Correct. 19 A -- is that correct? 20 Q. Yeah. А. 21 And did you go through those? 22 *Q*. I didn't actually look at everyone in detail if A. 23 the name wasn't the same. 24 Okay. So in other words, you you didn't look 25 Q.

website.

Q. Correct; thank you, I stand corrected. Let me let me ask you this, can you take a look -- I think it's Number 6, Exhibit 6, if I did my number correctly. I know these are somewhat out of order?

24	Q. And but not registered as a corporation?
25	A. Right.

And what happened when you clicked on that? 1 О. When -- the link that was provided there on the ACC 2 website, did it take you to another website? 3 No, no. Sorry I just don't remember exactly. А. 4 Did it have the words, trade name? О. 5 6 А. Yes; yes. And are you aware that the Arizona Secretary of 7 *Q*. State regulates trade names? 8 А. Yes. 9 So you -- you looked, you didn't find a 10 *O*. corporation registered as a corporation in the State of 11 12 Arizona. After not finding the Corporation with this name in the State of Arizona, did you go to the Arizona 13 14 Secretary of State's web page? Yes. 15 А. And on that web page, which I would like you to 16 О. look at Exhibit 7, number seven? 17 Uh-huh. 18 А. Can you tell what that reflects? 19 *O*. That is registering a name of the Foundation For 20 А. Responsible Government. 21 Okay. And it does not state the word, 22 О. incorporated on that --23 No. it does not. 24 А. And do you see the very top of that where it 25 Q.

starts the information are the words, File ID are listed? 1 2 Α. At the very, very top of the page. Where it says, general information and then О. 3 there's box of information? 4 Yeah, yes. Five, six, three, five, two, seven. 13 А. О. And that's -- that's the matching number to the 14 15 Arizona Secretary of State --Yes, yes. 16 А. -- trade name? 17 Q. THE COURT: Ma'am, you're still talking over 18 one another. So, ma'am, I'm going caution you again, wait 19 until he's done, wait another second and then you answer. 20 THE WITNESS: I apologize. 21 MR. RABAGO: BY 2.2 Okay. So is it fair to say that after looking О. 23 at -- and you also used the Arizona Secretary of State 24 website; correct? 25

1 *A*. Yes.

2 *Q*. And you've used that many more times than the 3 Arizona Corporation Commission website?

4 *A*. Yes.

5 *Q*. You look up campaign data?

6 *A*. Yes.

Q. And on this occasion you used it to look up the
 registered trade name?

9 A. Yes.

10 *Q*. And that registered trade name, can you tell us 11 who the owner was, shown on the website, government 12 website?

13 A. I believe the name is Christine Bauserman.

14 *Q*. And is she listed as the owner?

15 *A*. Yes.

Q. And now, I would like to have you look at
 Exhibit 6, which I previously tried to ask you about, but
 it was the wrong page. Did you then also research any
 website that, on its face, had the name Responsible for - -- Foundation for Responsible Accountable Government?
 A. Yes.

Q. And is that a copy of a web page printed out from that website?

A. It looks exactly like it.

25 *Q*. Now, was the -- do you recall if the website name

1 was wwwfragaz.org?

2 A. I believe it's frag.org.

3 *Q*. Was there an AZ in there as well, do you recall? 4 *A*. I don't know.

Q. Okay. But it does not list -- when you researched
 that internet website for an entity presenting itself as
 Foundation for Responsible Accountable Government, did you
 find anywhere on that website stating that it was a

9 corporation?

10 *A*. **No**.

11 THE COURT: I'm sorry, what was the last 12 question?

MR. RABAGO: When she researched the website that popped up with the name, Foundation for Responsible Accountable Government, did she find anywhere in searching through that website, that this was a corporation and she already answered, no.

18 THE COURT: She said, no, and your question 19 was intended with, was it listed in -- in a corporation 20 anywhere at all?

MR. RABAGO: No. I can explain. I was going to address this a little bit in argument, Your Honor, but this website does not state it's a corporation and it is using the trade name that was just referenced, which also does not state that it's a corporation and that trade name is not registered to it, it's actually registered to
 someone else.

3 THE COURT: I understand your question now, 4 all I needed to do was understand your question. So your 5 other comments I will ignore and you can repeat them in 6 closing.

7 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor.
8 BY MR. RABAGO:

Q. Now, did you find evidence that this Delaware corporation, Foundation for Responsible Accountable Government, is operating in the State of Arizona?

12 A. Yes, I did.

13 *Q*. And what did you find that supports that 14 conclusion?

A. I found several things. I found that they have
 been responsible for a number of town halls, they have a
 blog that mentions Arizona, Tucson elections specifically,
 everything I located on there appeared to be specific to
 the City of Tucson.

Q. Let me turn your attention to Exhibits C -- I mean three, excuse me. Did you find what appeared to be official government I.R.S., Internal Revenue Service, documents online for this corporation?

24 A. Yes, I did.

25 *Q*. And what address was used for that tax document?

Christine Bauserman, 12221 East Makohoh Trail, А. 1 Tucson, Arizona, 85749. 2 THE COURT REPORTER: Can you please spell 3 that for me? 4 THE WITNESS: The street name? 5 THE COURT REPORTER: No, the name --6 THE WITNESS: B-A-U-S-E-R-M-A-N. 7 BY MR. RABAGO: 8 You may want to spell the street address a well? 9 О. M-A-K-O-H-O-A, Trail. 10 *A*. Is that an A or H? *Q*. 11 *A.* M-A-K-O-H-O-H. 12 And does that -- based on finding that document, 13 О. is that an accurate copy of what you found on the internet 14 and on the I.R.S. website? 15 To the best of my knowledge. 16 А. And did you see any information about whether or 17 Q. not this was a tax exempt organization under the I.R.S. 18 rule? 19 Yes, it's -- it's not on this page, it was on 20 А. this website. 21 Well, if you look at the very top of the page, 22 О. the biggest --23 I'm sorry, you're right; you're right. 24 А. Did you see that? 25 Q.

1 A. Yes, I'm sorry.

2 Q. What does that say?

3 A. Exempt organization.

Q. Okay. Based on finding this tax document, it didn't tell you what sort of tax exempt organization this was, did it?

7 *A*. No.

8 *Q.* Is Exhibit 4, can you take a quick look at that. 9 Is that a similar tax document but for a different year? 10 *A.* Yes.

11 *Q.* And what year is Exhibit 4 listed for?

12 *A*. **2014**.

13 *Q*. Go back to Exhibit 3, if you could and fell us 14 what tax year that was listed for?

15 *A*. **2013**.

16 *Q*. And do you see a category that has a statement of 17 doing business as?

18 A. It has nothing.

19 *Q*. But you did see a category there?

A. Doing business as, there's nothing after that colon.

Q. And what's the next category you see on that page?

A. Gross receipts.

25 Q. What can you read that, what does that say?

1 A. Gross receipts not greater than \$50,000.

Q. Okay. Is the same language on Exhibit 3 as well?
 A. Yes.

Q. After finding this information, did you then go to a -- a different website called CitizenAudit.org?

A. Yes, I did.

6

Q. And what do you know -- what is that website for
8 as far as you know?

9 *A.* It's a place where citizens can find out 10 information about corporation financial -- financial 11 matters, etc.

12 Q. Is it designed specifically to investigate 13 non-profits?

14 *A*. Yes.

Q. And did you find the name Foundation for
 Responsible Accountable Government, Inc., on that website?
 A. Yes, I did, it's an exhibit.

Q. Yes, turn in your exhibits to Exhibit 2. Is Exhibit 2, to the best of your knowledge, a copy of what you viewed on that particular website for the name Responsible for -- Foundation for Responsible You

Accountable Government, Inc.?

23 A. Correct.

Q. And did you find an address on this particular document linked to this corporation? A. 120 South Houghton 138-177, Tucson, Arizona,
 2 85748.
 3 Q. Okay. And did you see any purported information

4 about their assets and income for that year?

5 *A*. Zero.

6 *Q*. What year was that?

7 *A*. **2013**.

8 *Q*. And does it also have 12 on there?

9 *A*. **Oh**, yes.

Q. Now, further down when you researching this particular website, did you see anything about the type of 501(c) organization it was?

13 A. Yes, it was listed as a 501(c)(6) trade

14 organization.

15 *Q.* Okay. Was that your conclusion based on the 16 words, board of trade, that were on the website?

17 *A*. Yes, yes.

18 *Q*. And is that that on the exhibit?

19 A. Yes, right in the center.

Q. Okay. And your can you based -- I'm not I know your not an IRS agent, but can you tell us what your understanding of a 501(c)(6) trade organization is?

MR. BARBOUR: Objection, calls for a legal conclusion.

THE COURT: Sustained. Counsel, are you

1 still on Exhibit 2?

MR. RABAGO: Yes, Your Honor. 2 THE COURT: I could not find 501(c)(6) on 3 here, I found something about 501(c)(3) that says all 4 organizations except 501(c)(3). So where, if anywhere on 5 this exhibit, does it reference 501(c)(6)? 6 MR. RABAGO: Your Honor, that was the 7 question I asked the witness about -- that her conclusion 8 for that was based on the words, board of trade, which is 9 right smack dab in the middle of page right after it says, 10 all organizations except 501(c)(3), and then it says, 11 board of trade. 12 13 THE COURT: I'm little bit thick this morning because I'm not finding that language. Can you 14 direct me more specifically? 15 MR. RABAGO: Yes, Your Honor. There's 16 language in the middle of the page above the big bold 17 category says, federal tax disclosures, right above 18 federal tax disclosure. 19 I see. THE COURT: Thank you. And further down on that website, what --21 Q. who is listed as the name of committee chairman? 2.2 Christine Bauserman. А. 23 And what address listed there? 24 О. 12221 East Makohoh Trail. 25 А.

Now, turning to Exhibit 11 -- excuse me, 1 О. Exhibit 12, did you in recent weeks visit the same website 2 for campaign finance reports from the City of Tucson? 3 Yes. А. 4 Did you pull up a copy of the Campaign Finance О. 5 Administration Report that is provided here in Exhibit 12? 6 Yes. 7 А. And was that the a primary election finance 8 О. report for that same group, local independent expenditure 9 campaign group called Revitalized Tucson? 10 A Yes it is. 11 Did you go through the expenditures and donors, 12 О. 13 in that document? А. Yes. 14 If I can turn your attention to the 4th page of 15 О. this official campaign finance report in Exhibit 12? 16 А. Yes. 17 What entity did you see listed there? 18 *O*. I see two contributions listed, one Foundation 19 А. for Responsible Accountable Government to the amount of 20 50,000 -- \$50,200 and I see Todd Dunaway for the amount of 21 \$50. 2.2 And what address was used for the Foundation for О. 23 Responsible Accountable Government? 24 120 South Houghton Road, Tucson. 25 А.

What number -- is there some additional О. 1 information there? 2 Suite number, 138-177. 3 A And how does -- what is the occupation described 4 О. as? 5 Foundation. 6 Α. Now, have you seen billboards around Tucson --7 *Q*. Yes, I have. 8 А. Please wait until I finish the question. О. 9 Yeah. 10 А. Have you seen billboards around Tucson related to *O*. 11 the upcoming 2015 City Tucson City Counsel elections? 12 13 А. Yes. And have you read news reports about those 14 *Q*. billboards? 15 Yes. 16 А. And is it your understanding that those 17 Q. billboards were purchased by the Revitalized Tucson 18 Political Committee? 19 That is my --20 А. MR. BARBOUR: I object, on relevance, this 21 has nothing to do with whether the Corporation is 22 registered or not registered in the State of Arizona. 23 THE COURT: Well, I think the theory is they 24 are doing business in some fashion here, so I'm going to 25

overrule the objection on those grounds. 1 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. 2 BY MR. RABAGO: 3 Now, is it your understanding, in looking at 4 Q. Exhibit 12, and I'd like to turn your attention back to 5 that. And I'd like you to look, I think it's the 5th page 6 on Exhibit M? 7 THE COURT: All right, you're talking about 8 Exhibit 12? 9 MR. Now, based on your research of -- and what you 21 Q. 22 have seen with respect to these billboards and research into the campaign finance support of this committee, does 23 it appear to you that the -- that the foundation for 24 Responsible Accountable Government is almost 25

singlehandedly funding that committee except for that \$50
you mentioned?

3 *A*. Yes.

Q. Now, do you know when the ballots for the s election get mailed out for the general public?

A. Some have already been mailed out to military and
overseas voters, the remainders will be mailed out in
phases, starting probably October 6th.

9 *Q*. Okay, so less than a week?

10 *A*. Yes.

Q. Now, are you familiar with the term that's been in the media quite a bit and related to elections called, dark money?

14 *A*. Yes.

15 *Q*. What is your understanding of that term?

A. It's money that is contributed for political purposes without having to reveal the actual donors, able to perhaps conceal the donors behind another organization with the name, but the donors are not listed within that organization.

21 *Q*. And does that concern you?

22 *A*. Yes.

23 Q. Why does that concern you?

A. I have had considerable experience with this problem, it's definitely affects elections, it affects the

kind of information the citizens can get, who is
 influencing elections.

3 *Q*. Now, returning to Exhibit 12 on page four, I'm 4 sorry, page three.

5 A. Is that the detailed summary?

Q. Where it says, contributions, schedule A. I'm
r sorry, it should be the fourth page, my apology.

8 A. Uh-huh.

9 *Q*. That was the testimony that relates to the 10 testimony you gave earlier about Foundation for 11 Responsible Accountable Government contributing \$50,200?

12 A. Correct.

13 *Q*. Now, on that --

THE COURT: You said -- so there's no 14 confusion, you're saying it's the fourth page. Are you 15 referring to the page number, page three of five? 16 MR. RABAGO: Correct, Your Honor, I think 17 that's my 4th page. Let me double-check. Maybe I 18 miscounted. It's the fourth actual page and it's listed 19 as schedule A, page three of five on the bottom. 20 BY MR. RABAGO: 21

Q. Are we looking at the same page Ms. Tellman, it says Contribution From Individuals at the top?

24 *A*. Yes.

25 Q. That's the page we looked at earlier that --

1 *A*. Yes.

2 Q. -- showed \$50,200?

3 *A*. Yes; yes.

Q. Does anywhere on that page does that information
that you looked up on this official document from the City
of Tucson tell the public that this is a corporation? *A.* I do not see the word corporation there with
the name--

9 Q. Do you see the I --

10 A. I see --

11 THE COURT: I'm going to caution you both 12 again not to talking over each other. You're both doing 13 it. Take your time. Slow down, take a breath, wait until 14 one is done speaking before the other one speaks.

15 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor.

16 BY MR. RABAGO:

Q. When you looked at the website for this entity, using the name Foundation for Responsible Accountable Government, did they tell you much about what specific activities it is engaged in?

A. They have a very general description of their mission which is something of the nature of making citizens aware of responsible government, that kind of very general thing, and then they have specific thing that they have done. 1 *Q*. Do they --

THE COURT: I didn't hear you ma'am on the general mission.

THE WITNESS: They have a general mission, I don't remember the exact statements, it's been a very general about in forming citizens about the government. BY MR. RABAGO:

Q. Does it have any -- do you recall if it had any
statements about holding government accountable?

10 *A*. Yes.

11 Q. Okay. Making them responsible and accountable?
12 A. Yes.

Q. Now, in your research of this name, and aside from when you already testified to, did you find any other examples of any conduct engaged in by this entity that you were aware that you could find?

A. All the examples I found were related to the City
 of Tucson elections.

Q. Okay. Was there information maybe about the bond
or election under town hall website?

A. Yes; there were a number of town halls that -- I believe three town halls and various issues.

23 Q. But all that information you found was 24 election-related?

A. Yes, City of Tucson election-related.

Q. And the County as well from what you just
 mentioned, right? Did you find any information what so
 ever about that you could see where this entity was active
 in any other place?

5 A. No.

Q. Any information you testified to on the exhibits
we presented is accurate, insofar as it was presented on
the website on these government and other websites where
these copies were printed from?

10 *A*. Yes.

Q. Now, by their own name, is it your perspective that they are in the business of influencing government and holding the government accountable?

14 *A*. Yes.

Q. But all you found was related to these elections? *A.* Yes, these local elections.

MR. RABAGO: Your Honor, I'm finished with my guestions.

19 THE COURT: Thank you.

20 Cross-examination?

MR. BARBOUR: Yes, Your Honor.

25 *Q*. So between, 20 to 40 hours a week pretty much

I wouldn't say that; no. Election season is 2 *A*. relatively short and major elections are only once every 3 two years. 4 Okay. All right. So half time, the rest of time О. 5 I believe you said --6 Maybe less. 7 А. -- maybe 20 hours a week? О. 8 Do you support any causes that identify with 9 the Republican party? 10 No, but the ACLU certainly has Republican people 11 А. on its board, it's a non-party organization. 12 I don't think I asked about the ACLU, I said 13 Q. Q. For for the Defendant, have they engaged /do you know if they have engaged in any contracts, where they are selling anything where they are providing a service, where they are purchasing anything, whether they are receiving a service?

17 A. Not directly.

18 *Q.* Do you know of something indirectly?

A. They are donating to an organization that hasmade contracts.

- 21 *Q.* But they themselves haven't made any?
- 22 *A*. **No**.

23 *Q.* Are they transacting any business within the 24 state then?

A. I think their attempt to influence an election,

1 isn't a type of business transaction.

2 Q. How is that?

A. Because they are spending large sums of money in
 the City of Tucson, they are indirectly through --

5 *Q*. In exchange for what, ma'am?

6 A. In exchange for election results.

Q. Are you saying that they are purchasing votes
somehow?

Q. So I'm not clear exactly what the business is that they are engaged in, what they are transacting within the state?

A. They have not directly done business, but I
 believe that indirectly they are.

15 *Q.* So they have not done business in the state?

A. It depends on how you define business.

Q. Okay. All right. So nothing -- nothing in the tractional sense say, one would normally think of the average Joe on the street wouldn't think of transacting business, selling a pack of gum at the convenience store, getting your car fixed, something like that?

A. No, but if somebody gives me --

THE COURT: Hang on a second, you need to

A. They claim that as their business, as their job, whatever, that is their intent. I don't know what word you want to use.

Q. Have you heard heard them say that's their line of business?

A. I have not heard that particular word.

24 *Q*. Have you heard something similar to it?

25 A. That that is their mission.

1 *Q*. To hold accountable --

2	MR. BARBOUR: I think that's all, Your Honor.
3	THE COURT: Thank you. Redirect?
4	MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor.

6	REDIRECT EXAMINATION

10 *Q*. **Okay**.

11 A. I do not know, it's unclear.

12 *Q*. And the other address on Houghton Road, which has 13 number of suites attached to 138-177, do you remember 14 that?

15 *A*. Yes.

Q. By suite numbers, do you -- did you come to -did you come to a conclusion that is probably an office address or a mailing address, like a post office address, perhaps even?

20 A. Possibly, I don't know.

21 *Q.* Okay. Do you know if they give out free post 22 office boxes to people?

23 A. I've never seen it.

Q. You don't personally know what they are doing, but can you infer, or have you made the inference, that 1 they are doing some sort of activity that require some 2 expenditures in Tucson?

3 *A*. Yeah.

4 *Q*. Do websites come free?

5 A. No.

Q. Now, they are advertising information on their
websites about the City of Tucson elections; correct?

8 A. Correct.

9 *Q*. Did you happen to read today's Arizona Daily 10 Star?

11 *A*. **No**.

12 *Q.* Okay. Did you read any articles yesterday about 13 the push poll survey being done by this corporation?

14 A. Yes, and it says that on their website.

15 *Q*. And do you foe what a push poll is?

16 *A*. Yes.

17 *Q*. What is it?

18 A. It's poll in which questions are asked in such a 19 way to --

THE COURT: None of this was covered on cross so it's not proper redirect.

MR. RABAGO: Well, Your Honor, I'm trying to establish that they had to have expended some monies and she doesn't have direct information or access to contracts, but that's -- I mean it's there and that's, you 1 know, where the inference is.

THE COURT: You're pursuing expenditure 2 issues that was covered on cross? 3 MR. RABAGO: Correct, Your Honor. 4 THE COURT: All right, I'll allow it. 5 THE WITNESS: Repeat the question. 6 BY MR. RABAGO: 7 What is a push poll? Now, there was a question asked about you *O*. 23 if your grandparents gave you money is that business 24 activity? 25

1 *A*. No.

2 *Q*. Are your grandparents a corporation?

3 *A*. **No**.

Q. Okay. So it's a different thing, right? *A.* Definitely.

Q. Now, to the extent that questions were asked
7 about the harm, do you recall those questions?

8 *A*. Yes.

Q. Have you also either in the application for temporary restraining order indicated that part of the harm is that this out of state corporation that is not registered in Arizona is almost singlehandedly bankrolling what you have described as a negative misleading political campaign of the billboards?

15 A. That is my impression.

16 MR. BARBOUR: Objection, leading.

17 THE COURT: Sorry?

18 MR. BARBOUR: Objection, leading.

19 THE COURT: This was leading, I'm going to 20 sustain that.

21 BY MR. RABAGO:

Q. What would you describe the harm as being in relation to this out-of-state corporation making over \$50,000 contributions to the Revitalize Tucson Political Committee? A. I believe the harm is that it will influence
 voters; it has influenced voters already.

Q. Of course you don't know what everybody thinks
 4 because you're not all those --

5 *A*. No, sir.

6 Q. -- voters; correct?

7 A. Correct.

You don't know the registration 7 О. requirements under 501(c)(6) then to start talk about it 8 then --9 THE COURT: Hang on a second. Make sure 10 he's done before you answer them and that's so the record 11 12 is clear and I'll understand the testimony better. 13 Ask your question again. BY MR. BARBOUR: This is no one's business who 16 the donors are. 17 THE COURT: Why is it anybody business? Ιf 18 for example if I gave if \$10 for the Corporation for 19 Foundation For Responsible Accountable Government Inc., 20 why is that anybody's business? 21 MR. RABAGO: Well, first of Your Honor, you 22 wouldn't know you were giving to a corporation, because it 23 doesn't identify itself as such if you go on their 24 website. 25

Secondly, we don't know if they are engaging in business or not, they certainly have an addresses here, they filed taxes --

THE COURT: Well, that's a different issue,, 4 you asked -- you asked to be allowed to ask for who the 5 donors are, and I don't really see why it's anyone's 6 business that a member of the public decides to send \$10 7 into an entity, maybe without even knowing who they are or 8 what they do, why is that anyone's business --9 MR. RABAGO: Well, Your Honor in terms of --10 THE COURT: -- I mean at this hearing. 11 MR. RABAGO: Sure, I understand. The first 12 question was -- well, I'm trying to establish what are 13 they really doing here, are they truly in -- what is their 14 activity? 15 THE COURT: Well, you can ask her if all 16 their money comes from donations as far a she knows, you 17 can ask that. 18 MR. THE COURT: No, I will allow it. 22 THE WITNESS: No, they are not political 23 contributions, they are for policy advocacy. 24 BY MR. RABAGO: 25

Q. So in your role as chairwoman of the political
 committee your committee has reported these as political
 contributions; you're aware of that, right?

A. They are on a political form, yeah.

Q. Yeah a political form, the campaign finance form by which political contributions are reported to the public; right?

8 A. Well, the treasurer -- you know there's category 9 when you make transactions of what it is and the 10 Foundation reports them as it's political advocacy.

11 *Q*. It is so --

4

A. Or policy or advocacy for -- that means they are
 advocacy rights.

Q. And those are reported on a campaign finance document, I believe one that you signed as political contributions --

17 A. Revitalized Tucson does a report.

Q. Correct. So in your role as a chairwoman of Revitalized Tucson, you reported these donations from this corporation as political contributions; correct?

A. If that's what the -- what is that -- do you have the exhibits?

Q. I do have Exhibit 12, please, have a look at it? *A.* There's like A, B, C and D -- in front me? *Q.* Sorry, let me -- I forgot those were no longer in

1 front of you.

A. They are contributions from individuals, the
Foundation contribution from the -- an individual the way
it's reported.

Q. Okay. As a political contribution. You
 understand, what political contributions are, right Ms.
 Bauserman?

8 A. I'm not a treasurer.

9 Q. I didn't ask you, you're the chairwoman? 10 A. Right.

11 *Q*. Do you understand what a political contribution 12 is in this country?

13 *A.* No, I guess I don't. What I mean, a political, 14 contribution, what are you asking?

15 *Q*. Well, in politics and elections people donate 16 money to campaigns, those are called political

17 contributions, do you understand this?

18 A. Okay, yeah; then this is not political

19 contribution because this is not a campaign.

20 *Q*. The Revitalize Tucson Committee is not a 21 political campaign?

A. It's a committee, it's not a campaign.

Q. Well, it's an independent expenditure campaign for this election, do you understand that?

25 A. It is, but -- okay, yeah.

Okay. You're running this -- this political О. 1 committee, you're aware of that, right? 2 Right. 3 А. And I guess I'm having trouble believing that you 4 О. don't know that these are political contributions when 5 you're the chairwoman, I'm just trying --6 THE COURT: What you believe or don't 7 believe is not relevant here. 8 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. 9 THE COURT: So please don't state your 10 opinions about what is believable or what's --11 MR. RABAGO: I appreciate that, Your Honor, I 12 13 apologize. THE COURT: You can certainly advocate in 14 15 closing argument, but even in closings, I don't want you telling me what you do or do not believe. 16 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. 17 BY MR. RABAGO: 18 So you indicated -- the question I had asked 19 *Q*. before we left for lunch, the other question was -- in 20 relation to these issues, was the Corporation's intent not 21 to make anymore contributions, you said they were grants, 22 but then I asked you what would happen if somebody made a 23 request, do you remember that testimony? 24 Yes. 25 А.

And you said you would consider that request? О. 1 The policy is the board will consider -- of 2 *A*. course, we'll consider all grant requests. If you would 3 like to make one, if the Democrat committees would like to 4 make one, they can make one, too. 5 THE COURT: Ma'am, just answer the question. 6 THE WITNESS: Okay. 7 BY MR. RABAGO: 8 And you are the person that, as the chaired *Q*. 9 committee, it was your committee that made the request to 10 this corporation; correct? 11 А. Correct. 12 13 And then as the president of this corporation, О. you wrote the check back to the committee that you chair; 14 15 correct? That is correct. 16 А. And you called that a grant and not a political 17 *Q*. contribution? 18 Correct. 19 A Is anyone who denotes to the Foundation for 20 О. Responsible Accountable Government, Inc, are they a member 21 of the organization as a --22 MR. BARBOUR: Objection, again, we're going 23 back to the identity of donors. 24 THE COURT: Sustained. 25

PIMA COUNTY - SUPERIOR COURT

1 BY MR. RABAGO:

How does one become a member? 2 *O*. THE COURT: Counsel, just so that you both 3 know, I'm going to assume that donors could be anyone 4 under the sun. 5 MR. RABAGO: Correct, Your Honor, I 6 appreciate that. 7 BY MR. RABAGO: 8 Can anyone be a member of your corporation by О. 9 donating? 10 THE COURT: When you say "member", are you 11 talking about the defendant corporation? 12 13 MR. RABAGO: Correct, Your Honor. THE COURT: Okay. So when you say "member" 14 15 do you mean shareholder, do you mean board of directors member, what do you mean? 16 MR. RABAGO: They are registered as a trade 17 member organization, think Chambers of Commerce or NFL 18 they have different members of line of business or trade 19 that come together for -- typically for a specific line of 20 business. 21 THE COURT: So you're now judging this to an 22 LLC with members. 23 MR. RABAGO: I'm not sure how they run it 24 actually, Your Honor, that's why I'm inquiring how does 25

one become a member for their purposes as they identify 1 themselves to be a 501(c)(6) trade organization. 2 MR. BARBOUR: Objection, Your Honor, I'm not 3 sure I understand why running a corporation is relevant to 4 to any claims that they have. 5 THE COURT: Well, I am going give the 6 parties some latitude here. Frankly, I'm curious about 7 the structure of things myself, so I'm going overrule that 8 and understand that ultimately I'll decide what's is 9 relevant and how much weight --10 MR. BARBOUR: Of course. 11 THE COURT: -- allocate to relevant 12 13 evidence, and what to exclude as irrelevant or what to determine has little relevance or little weight for me in 14 determining the case. But I think it's important to allow 15 the parties some latitude in this context. 16 MR. BARBOUR: Understood, Your Honor. 17 THE WITNESS: So what was the question 18 again? 19 BY MR. RABAGO: 20 Can anyone who donates to the Corporation become Q. 21 a member by virtue of their donation to the Corporation? 22 Yes. А. 23 So if -- if my client, for example or member of О. 24 public donates to -- on your website, that makes them a 25

1 member?

Is -- yes. 2 А. THE COURT: Is that automatic, ma'am, 3 if you donate you become automatically a member of the 4 **Defendant Corporation?** 5 THE WITNESS: Yes. 6 BY MR. RABAGO: 7 Now earlier you said that you conduct no business О. 8 activity anywhere in the United States, do you remember 9 that testimony? 10 A Yeah. 11 So the activity that we have identified today, 12 О. these donations to Revitalize Tucson, the telephone 13 survey, the town halls and the e-mails, would you consider 14 15 that then your primary purpose? It's -- yes, the foundation is for government 16 А. accountability. 17 But did you understand the question? 18 *O*. Is that my primary purpose? 19 A. The conduct that was described earlier today in 20 О. today's testimony, including the contributions, the 21 telephone survey that was referenced, the town halls that 22 you talked about, and your e-mails that you referenced, 23 would you consider that activity a primary purpose of your 24 corporation? 25

A. Yeah, it's government accountability and we do
 that mostly through e-mails and educational through town
 halls.

Q. Is the answer "yes" that conduct described your primary purpose?

A. Yeah, I mean we don't do a lot of polls, but -7 Q. Referring to everything?

8 A. What?

9 *Q*. Everything, the -- do you have other examples of 10 activity that you have done or do?

A. I'm mean that's our -- yeah, we're trying to hold the government accountable, so we're trying these different veins, it's kind of knew how we're going to, you know, educate people and show how we hold government accountable and what works and what is successful, so --

Q. So your testimony is that that conduct, that I just described, is what your primary activity is and the purpose of your activity is to hold government accountable and responsible through that activity?

20 A. Correct.

Q. As an individual, do you -- are you registered of a particular party?

23 A. Yes, I'm a registered Republican.

24 Q. Are you active in the Republican party?

A. I'm a pre -- elected precinct comitteeman and a

1 state committeeman.

2	Q. Do you engage in other activities that are
3	Republican-oriented activities, whether they are
4	committees, like the Republican senatorial campaign
5	committee, similar types of committee and conduct that was
6	asked of my own client earlier?
7	A. Yes.
8	Q. Do you participate in those?
9	A. Yes.
10	Q. And are you employed?
11	A. Employed I have a consulting company.
12	Q. Okay. What does that consulting company do?
13	A. Successful strategy, I consult on political
14	political things right now.
15	Q. Okay. Do you consult on political campaigns?
16	A. A campaign right now, currently, no.
17	Q. Okay. In the past you have been a consultant on
18	political campaigns?
19	A. I have been campaign manager, scheduler, things
20	like that, I have been staff on campaigns.
21	Q. Okay. The Houghton address is that a mailing box
22	or is that a business location, what is that address?
23	A. That is a P.O. Box so that people wouldn't know
24	where I lived.
25	Q. Okay. The Corporation is using that also as its

1 mailing address, is that so that nobody would know where 2 the Corporation lived so-to-speak?

3 *A*. Well, the Corporation is in Delaware, has an 4 address, that's where you sent the summons and the 5 complaint to me.

6 *Q*. Sure.

A. And -- but, yeah a lot of it was just -- you
know, I had been told not to use my personal address so
people wouldn't know where I lived and then -- but
sometimes you just can't help that.

Q. Got it. Well, so you did it for the same purpose then with respect to using the Corporation's address as that at that location on Houghton as well?

14 A. Right, it was a place on get mail; right.

Q. Correct. But you're not the Corporation, you're talking about your not wanting people to know your personal address, this is the Corporation; right?

18 A. Correct.

19 *Q*. Why didn't you use the Delaware address for that 20 corporation?

21 A. For mail.

22 *Q*. **Correct.**

A. Because I wanted to be able to pick up the mail. Q. Okay. And that's the same box that you pick up the political -- 1 *A*. Yes.

Q. -- mail for you're the campaign committee,
Revitalize Tucson, the political committee?

4 *A*. Yes.

Q. Now, Ms. Bauserman, you -- you use your personal
 address on the I.R.S. tax returns that are publically
 available on the internet; correct?

8 A. I have to --

9 *Q*. Okay.

10 A. -- the I.R.S. required that.

Q. And that's out in the world and available to the public, in fact, my client found it, it's available to the public; right?

A. Right, and that was after the establishment of the Corporation and the P.O. Box and then basically you can't get around it.

Q. Okay. Now, the trade name that was referenced earlier today, that is a trade name that you obtained under your name and you own that; right?

A. Yes, I have a lot of trade names. I develop websites and when you get a website it's always recommended to make sure the trade name is secure because you can go through all this problem of creating a website in a company and any company and then someone else can go to secure the trade name and rip that from you and it's a lot of work to redo it, so it's always recommended to
 secure the trade name, it's an easy step to do.

3 *Q*. **Okay**.

A. Even opening a bank account, they recommend you to search the trade name.

Q. Now you listed on that trade name registration
form, that the business of that entity or that trade name
is, community organizer; correct?

9 *A*. Yes.

Q. Okay. Now, this corporation is a Delaware corporation that you are president of, that's not community organizer, is it?

A. Is that listed as my occupation or the occupation
 of the trade name?

15 *Q*. We can look at it.

16 *A*. **Okay**.

17 *Q*. Let's just do that, that way there's no 18 confusion.

A. A lot of those questions are like my personal
 e-mail, my personal address, not the personal address of
 the trade name.

22 *Q*. **Okay**.

A. You know they are not asking you, this is the trade name and where does this trade name live.

Q. Okay. So turn to Exhibit 7, if you would?

1 A. I don't have that.

Q. Do you have that in front of you? Let me hand
you the official one as the Court asked earlier for us to
4 do. Handing you Exhibit 7?

Okay. That is the business type and so that was А. 5 probably in the beginning when it was started in 2013, you 6 get the trade name before you incorporate. So the 7 Corporation was still being formed and the officers and 8 everything -- you know, that -- the details are still 9 being established and the bylaws being written, the 10 Corporation being formed, so it was just like get the 11 trade name before somebody finds out about it and that way 12 13 you can secure the name. And it is community organizing, means holding government accountable, you know. 14

Q. Is it your understanding that community organizer is a purpose of a corporation registered as a tax exempt trade member organization?

18THE COURT: Are you talking about the19Defendant?

20 MR. RABAGO: Correct, the Defendant.

THE WITNESS: What was that?

22 BY MR. RABAGO:

Q. Is it your understanding that community organizer is a accepted purpose for your tax exempt registration of the Corporation as a 501(c)(6) member organization? 1 *A*. No, it's government transparency. Okay, so I put 2 this down just to secure the name.

3 *Q*. That was on January 22nd, 2013, according to this 4 document?

5 A. That the trade name was secured?

6 Q. Correct.

7 A. Correct.

Q. And it uses your address for Foundation For
9 Responsible Accountable Government; correct?

A. Correct, because it was -- like I said, the
 Corporation was not established yet.

Q. So this is a second government document available
 to the public online which has your personal address?
 A. Correct. Like I said, I realized you couldn't get
 around that in some cases, but --

Q. And the trade name is not, Foundation for
 Responsible Accountable Government Incorporated, is it?
 MR. BARBOUR: Asked and answered.

19THE COURT: Sustained.

20 While we're on that, ma'am the trade name,

21 you consider that your individual personal property?

THE WITNESS: I believe that's the law,

23 yeah.

THE COURT: In other words, you believe you own it personally?

THE WITNESS: I think that is the def --1 like I said, I've always just been -- you know, when you 2 go to open -- when you're going to do this stuff, everyone 3 says, get the trade name and anybody can go online and get 4 a trade name. 5 THE COURT: But you have to pay for a trade 6 name or do you just sign up? 7 THE WITNESS: I think it's \$5 or \$10. 8 THE COURT: It's a small amount? 9 THE WITNESS: Yeah. 10 THE COURT: It's money that you paid? 11 THE WITNESS: I don't remember on this case. 12 Like I said I've gotten --13 THE COURT: The Corporation -- the Corporate 14 Defendant didn't pay that? 15 THE WITNESS: No. it didn't exist at this 16 time, yeah. 17 THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead, sir. 18 BY MR. RABAGO: 19 Ma'am, there was some testimony about what's 20 О. currently was placed on your website on September 30th 21 regarding a telephone survey we talked about earlier? 22 Yes. A. 23 Did the Corporation pay for that? 24 О. Yes. 25 А.

How much did it pay for that? Q. 1 Do I have to tell that transactions of the --2 Α. \$4,000. 3 Okay. Q. 4 THE COURT: Let me make sure I understand 5 that. Are you saying that the Corporation, the Defendant 6 here paid for this phone surveyor? 7 THE WITNESS: Yes. 8 THE COURT: Not through a grant but 9 directly? 10 THE WITNESS: I -- it paid the -- I do 11 believe it paid the consulting company to do a survey. 12 We paid a consulting company to perform the survey. 13 THE COURT: Directly? 14 THE WITNESS: It paid -- well, it paid a 15 consulting company for consulting. 16 THE COURT: Did you write the check? 17 It was a bank transaction. THE WITNESS: 18 THE COURT: Was it a bank account of the 19 Defendant corporation or with Revitalize Tucson? 20 THE WITNESS: It was not -- Revitalize 21 Tucson had nothing to do with it. The Foundation -- and I 22 don't remember if the Foundation secured -- well it 2.3 secured the consulting company, but I don't remember which 24 25 consulting company it secured.

THE COURT: It's a phone survey to solicit 1 phone input here in Tucson? 2 THE WITNESS: The company or the --3 THE COURT: No, the phone calls that are 4 being made to take survey, are they calling folks in 5 Tucson? 6 THE WITNESS: Yes. 7 THE COURT: Okay. Go ahead, sir. 8 BY MR. RABAGO: 9 And so the Corporation spent approximately \$4,000 10 *Q*. to purchase that? 11 Yes. А. 12 Did you conduct that bank transaction personally? 13 Q. *A*. Yes. 14 MR. RABAGO: I have no further questions, 15 Your Honor. 16 THE COURT: All right. Let me just ask a 17 couple other questions. 18 The billboard expenditures, I thought you 19 said earlier they were done through the grant funding; is 20 that correct? 21 THE WITNESS: The billboard expenditures 22 were done by Revitalize Tucson. 23 THE COURT: In other words, Revitalize 24 Tucson solicited grant money and use the the grant money 25

to pay for the billboard? 1 THE WITNESS: Yes. 2 THE COURT: Okay. And the grant money came 3 from the Defendant corporation here? 4 THE WITNESS: Yes. 5 THE COURT: But in the phone survey 6 instance, it wasn't a grant mechanism? 7 THE WITNESS: No. 8 THE COURT: Can you tell me why the 9 difference? 10 THE WITNESS: Well, it's -- the Foundation 11 does it's own -- like does the town halls and does e-mails 12 and does educational purposes and it was to find out --13 and it was released to the public, it was made public just 14 15 so everybody could know what the issues are, you know, holding government accountable, what do the people want to 16 understand, what do they want to know. 17 THE COURT: So the foundation distinguishes 18 between things like phone surveys and town halls and just 19 different from buying billboard space. 20 THE WITNESS: Well, yes, its main form of 21 22 existence is for educational purposes; it has a town hall scheduled for Tuesday because the elections are really 23 confusing now because of the County being in charge of it 24 and the people and the City aren't going get mail-in 25

ballots now. So we actually have the election integrity 1 commissioners showing up to do an explanation of how this 2 election is being ran. 3 THE COURT: So when the Foundation bought --4 when the Foundation sets up a -- a town hall, do they have 5 to rent space? 6 THE WITNESS: It hasn't to date, but we may 7 have to for one in October. 8 THE COURT: So the town halls, do they 9 involve any expenditures directly by the foundation or 10 have they? 11 It's not like the -- the THE WITNESS: 12 Foundation usually does not write like a check to a hotel 13 to say, it would write a check to a consultant that wants 14 15 to put on the event. THE COURT: Does the Foundation pay the 16 consultant to put on the event? 17 THE WITNESS: It hasn't at this point, but 18 if -- there's an event where we might have with Martha 19 McSally and if she shows up there would be large people. 20 So, yeah, the board has decided -- it doesn't do anything 21 22 without the board asking the treasurer and everybody to make sure it's in compliance. 2.3 THE COURT: So I'm getting back to the phone 24 survey now. The Foundation, the Defendant here, paid 25

someone to run the phone survey? 1 THE WITNESS: Yes. 2 THE COURT: And that was a consultant that 3 was paid? 4 THE WITNESS: Yeah. 5 THE COURT: And you took care of the payment 6 to the consultant? 7 THE WITNESS: Right. 8 THE COURT: Can you tell me where the 9 consultant was located? 10 THE WITNESS: Well, it's either -- there's a 11 consultant in Tucson and there's a consultant in Phoenix. 12 THE COURT: Well, what I'm wondering is this 13 Tucson survey, where was that consultant? 14 THE WITNESS: Phoenix, the one who actually 15 ran the poll and did the, you know, gave the information 16 back. 17 THE COURT: So the Corporation then directly 18 sent a bank draft or bank payment order to a consultant in 19 Phoenix to run the phone survey in Tucson? 20 THE WITNESS: Yes. 21 THE COURT: Okay. When was that done? 22 THE WITNESS: A couple weeks ago, last week, 23 two weeks ago. 24 THE COURT: All right, thank you, ma'am. 25

Anything else before we step away from the 1 lectin? 2 BY MR. RABAGO: 3 When did the Corporation receive the results of Q. 4 that survey, was it a couple weeks ago? 5 No, it was this week; it was last like Thursday 6 А. night very, very late, then we made it public on Monday. 7 On Monday it was made? Q. 8 I believe it was Monday, wasn't it --А. 9 Your website says --10 *O*. Tuesday, I think it was Tuesday it was made A. 11 public. 12 13 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. No further questions. 14 THE COURT: All right. This would be --15 well, normally there wasn't -- normally there's direct and 16 cross and redirect. I'm going let both of you take 17 another turn with the witness, but I'm going to ask you 18 you not to repeat things that were already covered, treat 19 it as though it was redirect. 20 MR. like an e-mail, you have an e-mail distribution called
 Constant Contact, it does it's own surveys now, it did
 surveys.

Q. Okay, but this particular survey -- and between now and that e-mail survey you were talking about, that was what maybe two years, maybe?

7 *A.* Yeah.

THE WITNESS: Yes. 1 THE COURT: Was Revitalize Tucson, was it 2 set up after the Defendant corporation? 3 THE WITNESS: Oh, Revitalize Tucson was just 4 set up a few months ago; it's in Tucson. 5 THE COURT: Well, after the Corporation was 6 set up? 7 THE WITNESS: Yes. 8 THE COURT: And Revitalize Tucson has a 9 board of chairpersons? 10 THE WITNESS: It is an independent 11 expenditure committee, so it has -- no, it doesn't. 12 13 THE COURT: But you had listed two co-chairs? 14 15 THE WITNESS: You have a sponsor and a director and a treasurer. 16 THE COURT: So a sponsor would be Mr. 17 Antenori? 18 THE WITNESS: Yeah. 19 THE COURT: You call him --20 THE WITNESSS: Co-chair. 21 THE COURT: Then you're the chairperson? 22 THE WITNESS: Yes. 23 THE COURT: And the Defendant corporation, 24 it -- it -- you indicated that it's -- it's educational, 25

it's a corporation set up for educational purposes? 1 THE WITNESS: Yes. 2 THE COURT: And it operates on donations? 3 THE WITNESS: Yes. 4 THE COURT: And it sends -- it gives grant 5 money to certain entities that it considers worthy of a 6 grant? 7 THE WITNESS: Yes. 8 THE COURT: Has -- and you been asked this 9 before, has it given grants to anyone other than 10 Revitalize Tucson? 11 THE WITNESS: Not this year. 12 THE COURT: But the grants, they are drafted 13 on paper and they are sent or given to an officer of the 14 Defendant corporation? 15 THE WITNESS: Yes. 16 THE COURT: The Revitalize Tucson grants, 17 were they generally drafted by you? 18 THE WITNESS' Yes 19 THE COURT: The Defendant's -- the Defendant 20 corporations giving of grants, it was based upon a 21 decision of the board of directors of the Defendant 2.2 corporation? 23 THE WITNESS: Yes. 24 THE COURT: And the board of directors 25

BARBOUR: No, sir. 17 THE COURT: Thank you, you may be seated. 18 Any witnesses, exhibit, evidence by any of 19 the parties? 20 MR. RABAGO: No, sir. 21 MR. BARBOUR: Not from our side. Your Honor. 2.2 THE COURT: Do you each want to give closing 23 comments, one closing apiece. I ask you to to limit 24 yourself to 15 minutes or less with the understanding that 25

I had read and will reread the documents. I won't be
ruling from the bench, but I will be ruling as promptly as
I can.

One of the issues that I want to address is the statute that's been cited by the Plaintiff, A.R.S. 10-1502, subpart(F) and one of the questions I had was whether or not the Defendant is transacting business as that term is used in 10-1502(f).

9 Go ahead, Counsel.

10 MR. RABAGO: Yes, thank you, Your Honor. 11 Your Honor has heard a lot of testimony 12 today about this corporation that's out of state that 13 calls itself a foundation, it's a corporation, and you 14 heard a lot of testimony about what they do in Arizona.

15 This today, in relation to the statute that the Court cited and also in relation to a similar statute. 16 which is 11502(F), for non-profit corporations, both of 17 those statutes provide a very simple statutory remedy for 18 any person in this state to sue for an injunction to stop 19 an out-of-state corporation that has not received a 20 Certificate of Authority to conduct affairs in Arizona and 21 22 register with the Arizona Corporation Commission and provide other corporate filings as required by the Arizona 23 Corporation Commission. 24

25

Now, this out-of-state corporation calls

itself Foundation for Responsible Accountable Government, 1 Inc., and by that, what they do is they engage in 2 activity, which has been described as they are holding 3 government responsible and accountable, they also 4 described it as education. But what we heard is that they 5 have spent \$50,000 -- over \$50,000, \$50,200 on what are 6 identified a political contributions in the City Council 7 race, four transactions to that sum total. 8

9 We heard the testimony that they have 10 independently themselves paid for telephone phone survey 11 about the City Council on, you know, the eve of -- five 12 days now from ballots dropping for the City Council race.

This case is not about restricting anybody's 13 speech, what it is about is about citizens or the Attorney 14 General's right, either or, to file an action to stop an 15 out-of-state corporation that has not received a 16 Certificate of Authority to conduct affairs here, to make 17 them get one before they conduct anymore affairs. 18 It's a very simple process, it can probably be filled out in half 19 an hour. 20

And so this is not about stopping any political speech per se, this is about making sure that if they are going to participate in our elections by giving these contributions, by having these town halls, by paying for phone surveys, all conducted this year, no other conduct talks about, except for some e-mails, it's the
 only state in the union where they do this.

And there's no other activity that they do except for what they have described, then that is their business; they are in the business of giving contributions to campaigns here; they are in the business holding town halls about such campaigns or such issues on the ballot; and now running surveys about the City Council on the eve of these elections.

So what we are asking for, is that if they are going to be in the business of participating in our elections in the State of Arizona that the least they can do, is come from Delaware to Arizona and register in the State of Arizona as an out-of-state foreign corporation, which is a term for any corporation that's not incorporated here.

The matter is urgent, as we described, because in this context what we have is the chairperson of this political committee is the president of this corporation, the other board member of this -- or excuse me, co-chair or sponsoring individual for this committee is the board member for -- this other board member for this out-of-state corporation.

The treasurer, Mr. Sean Bailey, for the political committee is the treasurer for this corporation.

THE COURT: Mr. Rabago, you're swaying back 1 and forth, I'm going to ask you to keep a respectful 2 distance --3 MR. RABAGO: I'm giving the Court a vertigo 4 problem. 5 THE COURT: -- between yourself. 6 MR. RABAGO: What I should have done -- may I 7 approach, I should have done that at the beginning. I 8 apologize. 9 THE COURT: I don't want anybody to feel 10 uncomfortable by my arms waving about. 11 MR. RABAGO: I promise I won't hit Mr. 12 Antenori when I was waving --13 MR. BARBOUR: We're not concerned, Your 14 Honor. We're okay. 15 MR. RABAGO: Well, the matter is urgent for 16 those purposes. They spent money, they purchased things 17 here, they used a postal mailing address, they pay their 18 taxes out of Arizona, they hold town halls here, this is 19 their business, what they are doing, it's their business. 20 THE COURT: Wait a minute. Did you say -- I 21 just want you to explain this. Did they say they pay 22 their taxes out of Arizona? Are you saying that --23 MR. RABAGO: Correct. 24 THE COURT: -- that the Defendant 25

1 corporation is paying taxes?

MR. RABAGO: Well, no. Thank you for correcting me, or catching that, Your Honor. They filed their tax returns from Arizona using Ms. Bauserman's personal home address. We have not identified any physical address, there's been no testimony about it. There's been no testimony that they engage in anything else other than this activity.

So they call themselves a foundation, but 9 they are a corporation at the end of the day. There is a 10 distinction, the Court is more -- I had some citations in 11 our complaint but there is distinction between what a -- a 12 13 foundation is and that entity that's registered with the I.R.S. under 501(c)(3), that's what foundations are, I 14 tried to get into that, I understand why the Court didn't 15 go there or allow me to go there. 16

Then there are entities, such as a trade organization, such as the Chamber of Commerce, a business league, line of trade, think the NFL, that's also cited in our complaint, and they are different. And an entity, such as 501(c)(6), they are allowed to engage some political activity so long as its not their primary purpose.

And so at the end of the day, my client is concerned about the campaign that is being run with these

billboards and until the campaign finance reports were 1 released as public documents, nobody knew who had paid for 2 those other than the committee itself, nobody knew who 3 made the donations. But they given 50,200 and it was 4 approximately 45,000 or whatever to buy the billboards, 5 they singlehandedly have funded that campaigns. 6 They are allowed to do so. They have a freedom of speech under the 7 citizens of the United States, that is not what this case 8 is about. This case is simply about Arizona law and about 9 this being their business, that's all they do. And is it 10 commercial, in the sense that they are selling an item; 11 apparently not. But they are engaged in the business of 12 trying to influence an election, which they described as 13 holding the government accountable, and -- and they are 14 15 doing it through these campaign donations. Well, what was stark to me and shocking was 16 the attempt to describe --17 THE COURT: Wait a minute, whatever you felt 18 was stark or shocking is not relevant. 19 MR. RABAGO: Not to you. 20 THE COURT: You can submit to me what --21

MR. RABAGO: Okay.

THE COURT: -- you believe might be stark or shocking to an individual person --

MR. RABAGO: Sure.

1 THE COURT: -- but not you, that's stating 2 your own opinion about the case.

MR. RABAGO: I understand, Your Honor. 3 The attempt to describe political 4 contributions as grants flies in the face of credibility, 5 Your Honor. A political committee accepts political 6 contributions. We have the chairwoman of a political 7 committee on the witness stand and those campaign finance 8 reports are reporting those political contributions from 9 this other entity. Those campaign finance reports don't 10 disclose that it's a corporation, they don't disclose that 11 12 it's from Delaware. And on the witness stand, president of this corporation, who's also the chairwoman of this 13 committee, continued to refer to those as grants, and that 14 somebody asked her for a grant and that they give a grant. 15 There were no -- the Court's own questions 16 asked of the witness that just testified, provided the 17 testimony that there had been no other grants this year to 18

anybody else, no other donations so-to-speak. So that what is they are engaged in, that is their conduct, that's why they are apparently incorporated was that type of activity.

23 So when I asked about these different types 24 of activity, if that was their primary purpose, their 25 primary is expressed on their website, but what is that

conduct? That conduct is attempting to influence this 1 election which they are entitled to do, but we think if 2 that is there -- if that is their sole activity, and they 3 are operating out of Arizona, and they are operating in 4 Tucson, and they are buying telephone surveys and they are 5 in the midst of election with the same three board members 6 that are on this political committee, that the very least 7 that Arizona could require of them is to register their 8 out-of-state corporation here, present their bylaws to the 9 State of Arizona, have a statutory agent of service here 10 in Arizona before they are allowed to do anymore activity. 11 12 It's a simple thing for them to do, the burden is minimal. 13 What was not provided in the testimony by 14 the Defendant's witness was that there's an undue hardship 15 on it to register, that there's a problem with them

registering, that there's any sort of difficulty or 16 urgency why they shouldn't register. But on the other 17 side of the coin, we expressed and shown what we believe 18 the timing, their involvement in the election, the witness 19 who has testified about the misleading nature of the 20 billboard campaign that is being funded by this 21 corporation, and we heard about that and it's been 22 described as dark money. 23

Now, we have not alleged that this political committee is violating Arizona law, that's not what this

complaint is about, it's a very straightforward statutory 1 injunction case. In the old days, if the Court has been 2 in practice for awhile like myself -- or had been 3 practicing before you became a judge, Your Honor, the old 4 days there used to be lawsuits using a similar statute to 5 actually void corporate actions and the Legislature 6 changed that. And so most of the case that are out there 7 that talk about this particular provisions in the statute, 8 they are relying on those older cases where people had to 9 prove business activity or isolated transactions, they 10 were defending saying this is not really a business here, 11 because at issue oftentimes were actual substantial 12 13 contracts and whether or not a contract could be voided by one of the parties because the Corporation had not 14 properly registered; because the law said if you're not 15 registered in Arizona, your conduct is void. 16

The Legislature got rid of that and said, we're going to make a very straightforward simple process that says, any citizen, any person can file an action, so you don't have an interest in the contract, any person can file the action for an injunction and if they register, the case gets dismissed, it's a very straightforward process.

Now, we have gone through all the process of presenting testimony and talking about the exigency, we do believe there's exigencies related to the election because
they are bankrolling this campaign. But at the end of
day, I don't even know that the statute itself turns into
preliminary injunction, it's to be a straightforward
process if the Corporation doesn't want to register, they
don't have to, the Court can eventually issue an
injunction and they won't do any more activity here.

If they register -- and it doesn't mean they 8 are changing from Delaware, they are just simply 9 registering that they are here. They would still have an 10 incorporation elsewhere, they just register, we are an 11 12 out-of-state corporation in Arizona conducting our affairs But if they do that, this case by statute, by law, 13 here. gets dismissed. We're not -- we don't get into any 14 15 further discovery, we don't do anything that's the end of it; aside for asking for costs which are mandatory under 16 and reasonable fees under the statute. 17

But we think it's very important because an 18 entity that presents itself with a name that it's -- that 19 gives the impression and it's presented in the Affidavit 20 that gives the impression it's a charitable foundation, 21 22 when it's actually an out-of-state corporation and uses the trade name of somebody else that does not belong to 2.3 them and doesn't identify itself as a corporation, that 24 trade name, it's just a Foundation For Responsible 25

Accountable Government, it doesn't say incorporated, and 1 it says it's supposed to be a community organizer. And 2 when a corporation starts doing things that are -- and to 3 my client, it's in the affidavit and it's also in the 4 verified complaint, is misleading to the public. What is 5 this entity doing? Who are they? When you go to this 6 website, it doesn't tell you, it doesn't even tell you 7 it's a corporation, it doesn't tell you that you become a 8 member if you donate on the face of website, it just says 9 donate here. 10

Under the circumstance, we believe that is 11 harmful for the public, we believe it's harm for the 12 13 public in general and then more specific with respect to the impending elections. Now, if they register and they 14 15 get their Certificate of Authority, probably take about a week or two; I don't work at the Arizona Corporation 16 Commission, but I do -- have filed ACC paperwork, it's 17 very straightforward, you can pay for an expedited fee 18 even to get your paperwork processed faster. 19

20 Minimal burden, minimum burden on the 21 Defendant and the question that this Court is -- is going 22 to grapple with, and I anticipate this is what the 23 Defendant's counsel is going to argue that -- that that's 24 not business, what they are doing is not purchasing 25 something, it's not selling products, it's not

advertising, therefore, it's not business. What I would 1 submit to the Court is, that activity that's been 2 described today is the only type of business it engages 3 in, that is its purpose. And the statute itself give a 4 full limited exceptions as to what is not business and 5 says it's not an exclusive -- an exclusive list. And for 6 example, holding a board meeting here, corporation for 7 them or some other company maybe who wants to come to 8 Arizona, that's not considered business activity. 9

Bank trans -- bank servicing loan 10 corporation, they hold a bunch of mortgages, but they are 11 not based here, there's foreclosures, that's not 12 considered activity just because they have to hold a loan 13 that was originated in Arizona when they are actually 14 headquartered elsewhere. So there's a few examples there. 15 But under these circumstances where the only 16 activity that we see is their influence in an election, 17 which we're not saying itself is illegal under, you know, 18 freedom of speech or some other issue, that's what this 19 case about. We're just saying that given what has been 20 21 happening, given how the facts have been presented to this Court, given the fact that there is an election coming up 22 and that it took some work for my client to actually 23 discover who was behind this corporation? That's not 24 readily available. There was a lot of chain of dots, as 25

the Court can see, from the ten or so exhibits that have been admitted into evidence. So it's not public, being transparent as to the entity being corporation in Arizona, what they are doing here, what you see when you get on the website, who it is, but you have to operate only in Arizona, they are not operating anywhere else.

And we believe that -- if they are in the 7 business of donating to campaigns, they are the business 8 of holding town halls about election issues, they are in 9 the business of doing telephone surveys related to the 10 City Council during the City Council election and 11 releasing those a week before the ballot. And it's been 12 13 described even as was testified to here today as a push poll, which is a survey designed to be biased to influence 14 15 somebody and that was in today's newspaper. I asked Ms. Tellman about that she testified about that expenditure, 16 that was that we heard testimony from the witness for the 17 Defendant that that was their expenditure. 18

And so when you're doing that, we believe that that is the sort of activity, at a minimum, they should register here. Because it they claim to be responsible, they want responsible and accountable government but they are not being responsible and accountable to the Arizona law and to the Arizona Corporation Commission.

THE COURT: Let me -- I'm going to cut you 1 off, I want you to address the issue for me --2 MR. RABAGO: Yes -- Your Honor. 3 THE COURT: -- before you stop. The statute 4 that I referred to earlier talks about transacting 5 business in Arizona and then you used the term, primary 6 purpose. What is the source of your use of the 7 terminology, primary purpose? 8 MR. RABAGO: I refer to that terminology 9 because under I.R.S. code and regulations, a --10 THE COURT: So, it's not an Arizona law? 11 MR. RABAGO: It's not in Arizona law. 12 THE COURT: Okay. 13 MR. RABAGO: Yeah, I'm --14 THE COURT: Let me ask you a follow-up then. 15 Transacting business, do you believe it 16 requires a showing that the majority of the activity of 17 the Defendant be transacting business in Arizona or are 18 you arguing that just hiring the poll consultant directly 19 is sufficient to be transacting business in Arizona? 20 MR. RABAGO: I believe that hiring the poll 21 is certainly sufficient by itself, but I would extend that 22 to say that there --23 THE COURT: You answered my question. 24 MR. RABAGO: Okay, it's everything though, 25

1 Your Honor.

THE COURT: All right. Thank you, sir. 2 MR. RABAGO: Thank you, Your Honor. 3 THE COURT: And I did let Plaintiff's 4 counsel go for 20 minutes, so I'll let you go for 20 if 5 want sir. 6 MR. BARBOUR: Thank you, Your Honor. 7 I'd like to address few of the comments from 8 opposing counsel first, then I'd like to get to the 9 substance of my own arguments. 10 First of all, as to whether the Foundation 11 is in fact a foundation or not, that's something for the 12 13 I.R.S. to sort out. As far as whether we're allowed to use the name "foundation" in a trade name or, you know, as 14 an entity name, that's -- there's no problem. I mean, 15 whether it's a corporation or not, that doesn't matter. 16 Any -- any corporation -- excuse me, I should say, any 17 nonprofit entity in the state is a corporation, a 18 nonprofit corporation. I can't speak to Delaware laws, 19 I'm not licensed in Delaware, but I would suspect similar 20 policies are throughout the country. There's no such 21 thing as a foundation under Title 10 of the Arizona 22 Revised Statutes. 23 Under the statutes that they cite, 10-1502, 24

and 10-11502, they -- again, that's very correct, we're

going to argue that they are not transacting business in 1 the state. Of course that's not the argument that the 2 Plaintiff was making, Plaintiff's complaint -- it's hardly 3 an accident that in their paragraphs, I think it's 29 and 4 30, they deliberately misquote the statute, they broaden 5 it from transacting business in the state to conducting 6 affairs, not once but five times in two paragraphs, the 7 citations; that's not accidental, that's just 8 mischaracterizing what the law is in the state. 9

10 I mean they are mischaracterizing because I would argue, in order to encompass such things as exercise 11 12 of free speech by making donations to a local entity, and they can certainly do that as a foundation too because the 13 purpose of a 501(c)(6) organization, to the extent that 14 I.R.S. rules are relevant today, is to foster business 15 conditions, improve business conditions, that's exactly 16 what they are doing. The billboards themselves they 17 cite, you know -- you know, supportable and supported 18 statistics as to the miserable business conditions in the 19 town. We want those fixed, that's a perfectly legitimate 20 goal of the Foundation. 21

THE COURT: So then in your mind, is it a 501(c)(3) or a 501(c)(6)?.

MR. BARBOUR: 501(c)(6), absolutely. I mean, that's absolutely how it's registered, that's how the I.R.S. treats it; that's how -- that's how they operate.
 THE COURT: Thank you.

MR. BARBOUR: They are not in the business of 3 participating in Tucson elections, it's not a business, 4 it's simply not. Even if you're a candidate, it's not a 5 business. Your job is not campaigner, your job is not 6 candidate, your job is, you know, lawyer or current 7 elective representative trying to get into office. But. 8 you know, it's not -- it's not a line of business for a 9 person in that position, certainly not a line of business 10 for an organization twice removed therefrom. 11

And this is an entity donating money pursuant to request, not just voluntarily mind you, it is pursuant to request that they are donating this money to support an organization that supports local business conditions themselves, Revitalize Tucson.

There's -- there's no urgency in this case 17 Your Honor, there are a handful of billboards out there 18 put up by the local entity, Revitalize Tucson, and not by 19 the Defendant. The harm is so speculative, I mean, it's 20 pure speculation that there would even be another 21 22 donation, pursuant to request, it's speculative that Revitalize Tucson would even put up another billboard, 23 it's speculative that somebody would, you know, would be 24 swayed by those billboards. I -- there's only a handful 25

of them around town. What they cited as urgency is the
fact that overseas voters, who aren't even in town to see
these billboards might be swayed by the opinions of an
intermediate who's reporting what these billboards may
have said, as if that's the first thing you're going to
talk with your son or daughter in Afghanistan.

Now, the burden is not for us today to show 7 an undue burden on ourselves to comply, this is a 8 temporary restraining order hearing, I believe, and the 9 burden is on the Plaintiff to show that she's -- that 10 she's faced with irreparable and immediate harm and she 11 has admitted, on the stand, that the only harm that she 12 13 has suffered here is offense, she's taken offense of political advertisements, that's not something the Court 14 can grant relief for. 15

And while that's a past harm, that's exactly the same kind of harm she's saying today is grounds for the injunction, I'm afraid I'm going to be offended further; there's no relief for that, Your Honor.

As to dark money, it's just name calling. They -- they admit themselves very openly that there's no violations of any election law, there's no violations of any tax law, they can hardly -- they can hardly even allege that there's a violation of corporation law under Title 10. You know, as I'm sure Your Honor -- Your Honor is aware, you know the definitions of what -- I'll just -- if I may just read to you from the statute itself. THE COURT: Sure. Let me know what you're citing.

MR. BARBOUR: Sure, it's Arizona Revised 6 Statutes 10-1501, authority to transact business required. 7 And now it does list -- it does require that a foreign 8 corporation not transact business until they are 9 registered, but then it gives a non-exclusive list of 10 exceptions to transacting business, including, transacting 11 12 business in interstate commerce and -- where is it? 13 Conducting an isolated transaction that is completed within 30 days and that is not one in the course of 14 repeated actions of a like nature. 15

The only transaction that they can -- you 16 know, transaction with the capital "T", I suppose, the 17 only transaction they can cite is that they hired a 18 consultant service in Phoenix who very well could have 19 been in any other state, it doesn't matter that it was in 20 Phoenix, to do this job of calling people and finding out 21 where they, you know, were they satisfied with local 22 politicians, you know, a feeler, it was a survey, and that 23 wasn't even a service for them, they released that 24 information publically. Again, an isolated incident, once 25

1 in the entire existence of the Corporation.

Also, the list, like I said, is not 2 exclusive, you know, there are any other categories of 3 activity that the Judge may find as not qualifying as 4 transacting business. And I think (D), 1501(D) is 5 а clear -- is a clear illustration of the direction the 6 Court should take. It says, this section does not apply 7 to insurance corporations or corporation transacting in 8 this state only in the business of lending monies to 9 religious, social or benevolent association. 10

My goodness, lending money is still 11 profitable activity, that's still a transaction as the man 12 13 on the street knows it. But even there, that doesn't qualify as transacting business, if it's given to that --14 if you're dealing with a religious, social or benevolent 15 association. That's what effectively what we're doing. 16 We've got a -- we've got an out-of-state corporation 17 that's donating money, not even lending it, but donating 18 money to a social association, an independent political 19 There's no transacting business here expenditure here. 20 at all, all there is is free speech. 21

Now, I'd like to go into a little more substance here. Now, as I said, there's no relief for an allegation of so-called dark money. It's not about dark money, there's no allegations of wrongdoing here. There's no relief for being offended at political expression or
local billboards which is, again, the only harm that the
Plaintiff can allege. There are no allegation of
impropriety under tax laws, election laws, no relief under
any of those.

Now, there could be an action to enjoin 6 transaction business of a foreign corporation if it's not 7 registered in the state. As I said, of course, they are 8 not transacting business. Now, the only thing that they 9 have done, that survey, it's not a transaction of 10 business, it's the exercise of free speech. They are 11 gathering information and they are sharing that 12 13 information. Same thing, you know, if you want to expand that and say the donations were somehow transactions, same 14 15 thing. They are expressing their support for an organization that will use those funds to -- to, you know, 16 to take positions on, you know, on the upcoming election. 17 The Defendant is not supporting any 18 candidate one way or the other, it's supporting business 19 conditions in the City and that's quite appropriate and 20 21 certainly in line.

Everyone knows, of course, that politics are contentious. What they are asking for here is, you know, fundamentally I think -- I think, and I hope the Court will see -- see it as I do, I --

1 THE COURT: Whatever you see, is not 2 relevant to me.

3 MR. BARBOUR: Of course.

THE COURT: You can argue what you believe is reasonable under the circumstances with you advocating what the statutes mean, that type of thing.

7 MR. BARBOUR: Of course. Your Honor, I will 8 admit that their concerns about transparency are a little 9 relevant here and I will say that their complaint is very 10 transparent. I -- I will tell you this, it's a cynical 11 approach to -- to clamping down on the expression of 12 political opinion and in the bargain to try to collect 13 some attorney fees in the process.

There's nothing, there's no harm that merits 14 any relief here. You know, if I -- if I may adopt a quote 15 from Carl von Clausewitz, he said -- you know originally 16 he said, war is continuation of politics by other means, 17 but litigation is a continuation of politics by other 18 means, and the Court is not to be swept up in, you know, 19 supporting political position, one way or other, and 20 that's exactly what Plaintiff is trying to do here. 21 The -- this is not -- it's not election law, 22 it's strictly politics, it's one way or the other. I 23 don't like what that person said, I don't want to hear it, 24 I want them clamped down. You know the -- the activities 25

they have engaged in, they are not only not forbidden by 1 any statute, they are expressly protected by First 2 Amendment as Counsel says, Citizens of the United. 3 Now, let me get back here. Now, if 4 Defendant -- excuse me, if Defendant had been transacting 5 business buying, selling, contracting for services one way 6 or the other, other than for the public benefit, which is 7 what they have done, maybe there would be a claim under 8 1501 or 11502 -- excuse me 1502 or 11502. But, you know, 9 we're not dealing with transaction business, we're not --10 THE COURT: Let me ask you a question about 11 12 that comment. If they had been doing business other than for public benefit, is there, what you might call, a 13 public benefit exception to the requirement that you 14 register if you're transacting business? 15 MR. BARBOUR: I would argue -- no, I would 16

not argue anything they did would otherwise qualify as a 17 transaction of business under the statute, but I would 18 also argue that having the polls conducted, issuing the 19 grants to the local entity, I think those are -- I think 20 those are perfectly fair activities that don't fall under 21 this statute here, they don't invoke their right to bring 22 a claim for injunction, they are free to do these things. 23 And I think --24

25

THE COURT: But is there something in the

statute or in a case that tells me if they are acting for the public benefit, the registration requirement does not apply?

MR. BARBOUR: I can't think of a case, but I think it's certainly good policy, certainly in conformity with this statute here.

7 THE COURT: So it's a policy argument you're 8 making. I just want to make sure I understood where it 9 came from.

MR. BARBOUR: Yeah; certainly, Your Honor. 10 Like I said, I mean, if there had been 11 transaction of business or if this were -- if this were 12 something other than a temporary order hearing, then maybe 13 something in the statute would apply, but neither of those 14 two; we're not asking the garden variety injunction today, 15 they are after the temporary restraining order and, of 16 course, they are also arguing that there's transaction 17 business; neither of those are before the Court here. 18

Plaintiff wants a temporary restraining order, she must first, I'm sure as the Court knows, show probability of success on the merits; she cannot, it's -it's literally impossible. The statute itself requires that the that her claim be dismissed if she gets the relief that she wants.

Now a temporary restraining order, that's

something different. That's not the ultimate relief in an
injunction claim. The statute -- let me go on here.
Number two, she must show imminent irreparable harm.
Again, the only thing she claims as potential harm, are
more billboards, put up by a third party not even by
Defendant.

Now, she can't even claim harm from, you
know, a secondary effect of their actions, she certainly
can't, you know, claim harm from the fact of the donations
themselves. It just doesn't -- it just doesn't work, Your
Honor.

Again, she's admitted that the only harm she had was that she felt offended and the Court is not here to avenge her feeling or to clamp down free speech.

You know, regardless -- regardless of what claim she think she has in the statute, it does not give her ground for a temporary restraining order. There's no urgency, there's no harm, there's no -- there's no equities here that balance in their favor.

You know -- and I mean, if they are claiming that the remedy is simple, and it could be done today, what is their -- what is there to enjoin really? There's nothing.

The -- the injunction is in the public interest. Well, what public interest would be served?

The interest of that part of the public that votes 1 Democrat, that's it; they are not the only public. 2 You know -- and, again, enjoining --3 enjoining the Corporation for making further donations, it 4 make no sense because they don't even have any plans to 5 make any further donations, there's nothing to enjoin in 6 their actions. Your Honor, there's just -- there's 7 nothing here that qualifies for temporary restraining 8 order. I mean maybe, if the facts were different, they 9 would have some claim for an injunction, the facts aren't 10 The facts they allege don't fall under the statute 11 here. here, and just simply nothing is ripe for temporary 12 13 restraining order.

THE COURT: Thank you, sir. Thank you 14 15 Counsel. Your presentations have been very thorough; they are very educational to me. I need to review the testimony 16 and the exhibits and I'm planning to issue a ruling from 17 chambers hopefully this afternoon, if I need more time 18 I'll mull it over on the weekend and I'll come in and put 19 something out during the weekend because I generally come 20 in, at least for a while, on Saturday or Sunday. 21

Mr. Rabago, something else? MR. RABAGO: Yes, Judge, I just wanted to apologize to the Court and Counsel. Counsel is correct, I did miscite the -- the language in there, that's not in

there, I went and looked it up right now. I think I was 1 looking at the old language, where the old statute states 2 conducting an enterprise and something else, that was 3 unintentional. I completely apologize for that. Thank 4 you for bringing that to my attention. 5 THE COURT: What paragraph is that? 6 MR. BARBOUR: Twenty-nine and thirty. 7 THE COURT: Twenty-nine, thirty. 8 MR. RABAGO: It does state transact business 9 activity, I just said conduct affairs. 10 THE COURT: All right, I'll make sure I take 11 into account that 29 and 30 have misstated the requirement 12 13 in the statute. MR. RABAGO: I miscited it, I misstated, 14 15 correct. THE COURT: I just want to make sure I look 16 at the correct statute. 17 MR. RABAGO: Correct. 18 THE COURT: Counsel, both of you agree I 19 should be looking at 10-1502 and 11-502? 20 MR. BARBOUR: Yes. And the statutes on both 21 sides of those, the definitions and other related 22 statutes. 23 THE COURT: All right. Thank you both for 24 25 your thoroughness and courtesy.
